Downhill Skiing

Cross Country Skiing

Gallatin National Forest, Livingston Ranger District, Route 62 Box 3197, Livingston, MT 59047, (406) 222-1892, has information on miles of cross-country trails including Suce Creek, Pine Creek, Mill Creek, Chico/White City and Big Creek.

Yellowstone National Park, 53 miles south of Livingston, offers skiers' shuttles and miles of groomed cross-country ski trails, along with other winter activities. Winter visitors can drive five miles in to Mammoth Hot Springs or further to Cooke City to enjoy the Parks many winter services. Xanterra Reservations 307-344-7311

Snowmobiling

The surrounding area contains over 100 miles of groomed snowmobile trails found in the Gallatin and Lewis and Clark National Forests, the Crazy Mountains, and the Absarokas. In the Crazy Mountains to the north, choose from the 20-mile shields loop, the 15-mile Cottonwood/Trespass Trail, or the Ibex Cabin Trail. In the Absarokas to the south, the Mill Creek area has 20 miles of groomed trails, Contact US FOREST SERVICE Livingston Ranger District, located at 5242 Hwy 89 South, 222-1892.

Biking

City Parks

Sacajawea Park: At the end of South Yellowstone Street on the banks of the Yellowstone River. Features a wading pool and playground for children, a beautiful lagoon, bandshell, and the Civic Center where the indoor scenes from "A River Runs Through It" were filmed. Watch the ducks and geese. Children under 13 may fish in the lagoon, no license is required. Play horseshoes, have a picnic/cookout, play tennis or take a stroll along the river. View Sacajawea & Pomp statue dedicated July 15th, 2006.

"G" Street Park: Located at the south end of "G" Street; contains a playground, wading pool and picnic tables

"M" Street Park: Located on North "M" Street and Gallatin; contains a playground and picnic area.

Depot/Rotary Park: Located at the Livingston Depot Center along Park Street between 3rd and 5th Streets. Picnic benches among the trees and a view of the railroad tracks.

Fun on the Water

Take a scenic or whitewater float trip on the Yellowstone River: Wild West Rafting in Gardiner at 848-7110, Yellowstone Raft Company in Gardiner at 848-7777, Montana Whitewater in Bozeman at 587-1764; Rubber Ducky on Park Street in Livingston at 222-3746. Enjoy the Livingston to Laurel 3-day boat float in July. No registration.

Windsurf on Dailey Lake, 30 miles south of Livingston, with Emigrant Peak hovering at 11,000 feet above. Daily Lake has the most consistent winds in Montana and is a safe lake with a gravel launch site and no obstacles. In addition to windsurfing, the lake is an excellent place to camp and provides great fishing for trout and walleye. Need equipment or directions and trails?
